Las Vegas USO Director Doug Bradford was in the Navy for five years. His father was in the Navy for 31 years. Two brothers were in the Army and two in the Navy. "The service is a fellowship that never leaves you." Regardless of what branch you are in, there's a desire to take care of people in the military," he said.

Following are some of the highlights from the article.

"I can't tell you how many times before the USO opened here, I'd be in McCarran Airport and see a soldier sleeping on his duffel bag. I would go over to him and ask how long he will be here. I heard sometimes that it would be 36 hours. I would call a hotel on the Strip and tell them about the soldier.

The answer always was to send him to the hotel, where they would put the soldier up for free. "The speaker is entertainer Wayne Newton and he is talking about his involvement with the United Service Organization, popularly known as the USO, at McCarran International Airport.

The USO sponsors sanctuaries where members of the military, veterans and their families can rest and refresh while traveling. They are also well known for the entertainment they bring to service personnel in war zones.

The McCarran USO opened on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, 2010, in the former US Airways first class lounge near the A and B gates in Terminal 1. On a recent weekday, Air Force physician Chris Ledford was waiting for his flight back to Fort Belvoir in Virginia. "When I travel, I see the USO as the reminder in every environment - even thousands of miles from a war zone - that we have a military that's still hard at work," he said.

The Las Vegas community has been "very receptive to the USO," he added. Various organizations support their fundraising efforts - they must repay the \$500,000 it cost to refurbish the space so it could be used for the USO - so they can become self-sustaining.

Bradford and his assistant, Ms. Wojciechowicz stressed that volunteers are always welcome and, since the McCarran USO is open all the time, there can be a schedule to suit everyone. Anyone wishing to volunteer can call the USO at 702-261-6590.



Your Mom wore nylons that came in two pieces.



When being sent to the principal's office was, nothing compared to the fate that awaited the student at home?





Home milk delivery in glass bottles with cardboard stoppers






